Emergency Response

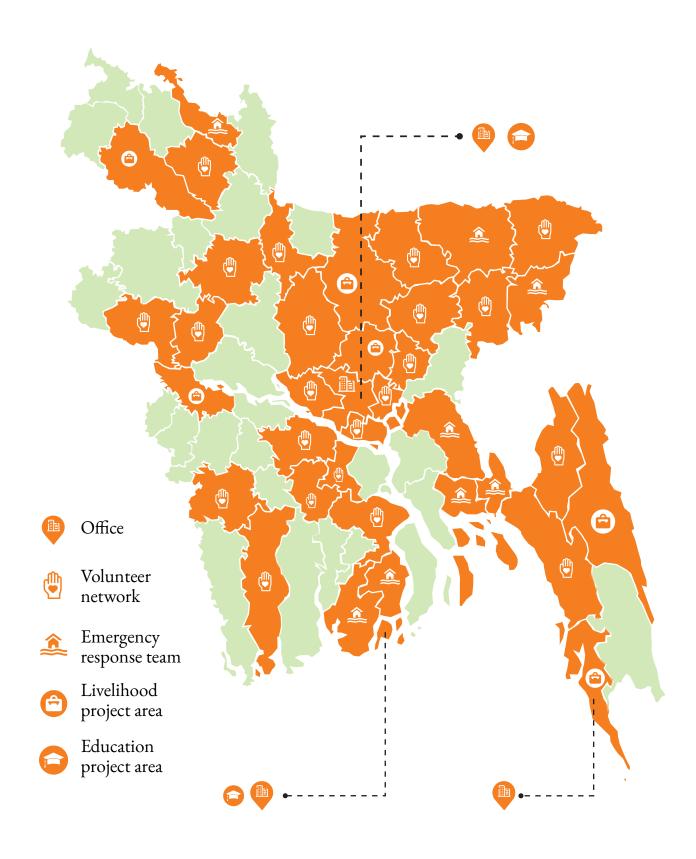

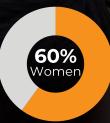

EDUCATION PROGRAM

We believe that education is the most powerful tool for breaking the cycle of poverty. That's why OBHIZATRIK School a cornerstone initiative of the Foundation, is dedicated to providing full-free, high-quality education to underprivileged children across Bangladesh. In 2024, our work was more critical than ever. The cost of education continues to rise, with a study showing a 25% increase in primary education costs and a staggering 51% increase for secondary students. This financial burden forces countless families to make impossible choices, leaving many children, particularly adolescent girls, at risk of dropping out. The consequences are far-reaching; a recent UNICEF report found that 33 million children in Bangladesh had their schooling disrupted by climate crises in 2024 alone, making our role as a stable and supportive learning environment even more vital.

To address these challenges, we go far beyond the classroom. Our comprehensive model is designed to remove every barrier to a child's learning journey. We not only provide full-free education but also assume all associated expenses, from free books and learning materials to nutritional snacks and cooked meals.

We know that a child can't learn on an empty stomach, which is why we also provide monthly grocery support to their families, ensuring that health and nutrition are never a barrier to their academic success. This holistic approach, which also includes regular health check-ups and festive assistance, addresses the academic, physical and emotional well-being of our students.

Today, we proudly operate two campuses: one in Mirpur, Dhaka and another in the remote coastal island CharLata, Patuakhali. Across these two locations, we are currently nurturing the dreams of around 600 students. Since our inception in 2013, we have successfully educated 8,400 students, preparing them to become educated, empowered, and financially independent citizens who are capable of making positive contributions to society.

By providing a safe and supportive learning environment, we are not just educating children; we are building a brighter future for entire communities. We are proud of our students and the impact they will continue to make.



Events Under Education Program

In collaboration with the Children's Film Society Bangladesh, SHOM (Spouse Head of Mission), and the Japanese Embassy in Bangladesh, Japanese children's films were screened for OBHIZATRIK School students. Students enjoyed four award-winning Japanese short films and received chocolates and gifts in hand-crafted cotton bags from them. Students shared handmade cards as a gesture of gratitude, making it delightful and memorable for them as well.

Students from DPS STS School Dhaka recently paid a visit to OBHIZATRIK School, where they engaged in a hands-on session, teaching our students the art of origami. Through this interactive experience, both sets of students had the opportunity to not only learn from each other but also to appreciate each other's talents, fostering a remarkably strong bond in the process.

Through this initiative we aim to protect our students from the risk of cervical cancer and other related diseases in the future.

A New Dawn: SATHI AKTER'S RESILIENT PURSUIT OF EDUCATION



Sathi Akter, a spirited student of Class 6 at OBHIZATRIK School carries with her a story of resilience and unwavering hope. Just a year ago, Sathi's life took a drastic turn when a devastating flood swept through her village in Chittagong. Their humble mud hut was submerged and fear became a constant companion as the water rose around them. Forced to flee, Sathi and her family found temporary shelter at a nearby school where they endured days of hardship, surviving on simple meals of puffed rice and water.

The flood had washed away not just their home but also their sense of security. Sathi's father, once a small business owner in their village, was left with nothing. Determined to rebuild their lives, the family made the difficult decision to move to Dhaka in search of new opportunities. In the bustling city, Sathi's father took up work as a rickshaw puller to support his family trading his previous livelihood for a chance at survival.

Amidst the challenges, Sathi's parents remained steadfast in their hope for a better future for their children. Their priority was education. They knew that despite their struggles giving Sathi and her younger brother Emon a proper education would pave the way for brighter days ahead. With this determination they approached OBHIZATRIK School where Sathi enrolled in Class 6 and Emon in Class 3.

At OBHIZATRIK School Sathi has found more than just education, she has found encouragement and support. Her parents' commitment to her schooling despite their hardships is a testament to their belief in education as a pathway to transformation. Sathi dreams of becoming a teacher one day inspired by those who have guided her through these challenging times.

Sathi says, "I want to study hard and become a teacher. I thought my study will stop but my parents worked so hard to give me this chance and I will make them proud one day."

Sathi's story is a reflection of the countless families across Bangladesh who face the harsh realities of climate change yet remain hopeful. Through the support of OBHIZATRIK School, Sathi and her brother are not just surviving, they are building their future. The school's commitment to providing quality education to vulnerable children like Sathi showcases the profound impact of community driven efforts to uplift those in need.

Together we stand by students like Sathi, fostering dreams, nurturing potential and building brighter futures.



BECAUSE HE BELIEVED CHANGE WAS POSSIBLE: SHAHRIAR'S STORY

At just eleven years old, Shahriar was already familiar with hardship. Living in a cramped flat in Mirpur with his paralyzed father and a mother who tirelessly supported the family as the sole breadwinner. Shahriar, a curious and kind-hearted Class 6 student at OBHIZATRIK School was no stranger to challenges.

On August 5th, 2024, as Dhaka's streets echoed with calls for change, whispers of injustice filled the air. Hopeful and driven by his innate curiosity Shahriar slipped out of his home to join the protest without telling his family. The atmosphere was charged as crowds gathered, chanting slogans for a better future. Shahriar with a sense of youthful idealism joined the march.

But the situation escalated quickly. Riot police charged and shouts turned to screams as officers opened fire. Amid the chaos a bullet tore through the air smashing into his leg. He collapsed to the dusty ground, blood pooling beneath him.

When Shahriar's mother received the terrifying phone call she rushed to the hospital. Upon arrival, doctors informed her that the bullet had shattered Shahriar's bone. That same night he was transferred to Dhaka's National Institute of Traumatology and Orthopaedic Rehabilitation (NITOR) for urgent surgery.

Surgeons worked through the night, setting his fractured leg and placing a metal plate to support the damaged bone. The road to recovery was long and grueling but Shahriar's spirit remained unbroken. His mother's unwavering presence beside his bed became his anchor and he drew strength from her love and determination. Throughout his recovery, classmates visited with handmade cards. Shahriar faced multiple surgeries and intense pain but his resolve never faltered. Even when walking seemed impossible, he tried hard to recover.

Despite the trauma and fear, Shahriar remained hopeful. His courage was not just in surviving but in choosing to keep moving forward to fight for his future and to embrace the support offered by his community.







LIVELIHOOD PROGRAM

The Livelihood Program of OBHIZATRIK Foundation helps thousands of families become financially independent. It provides them with the tools, training and support they need to earn a steady income and improve their quality of life. This program focuses especially on empowering women. More than half of the people who benefit from this program are women. This shows the foundation's strong commitment to breaking socio-economic barriers and giving everyone an equal chance to succeed.

The Livelihood Program has two main initiatives: **Shokkhom** and **Shakti**.

Shokkhom started in 2016 with the goal of using Zakat in a way that truly helps people for the long term. Instead of just giving temporary help, Shokkhom focuses on creating sustainable income opportunities so families can support themselves. From 2016 to 2024, Shokkhom helped 2,600 very poor families in different areas by providing resources, small business support and skill training to help them earn their own money. The program also encourages entrepreneurship, helping families become self-sufficient and contribute to their local economy.

The second initiative, **Shakti**, was first called the End Ultra Poverty Program (EUPP). Shakti works closely with ultra-poor families for 24 months to help them move out of deep poverty. It assesses the whole situation of the family including health, education and income with special attention to women's socio-economic needs. The goal is to help families become stable, confident and strong so they don't have to depend on charity or safety nets for a long time.

Together, Shokkhom and Shakti support OBHIZATRIK Foundation's mission to build strength, independence and steady growth for the poorest and most vulnerable people in Bangladesh. Through these programs families learn to stand on their own feet, create a better future and contribute positively to their communities. The foundation remains dedicated to bringing lasting change and hope to those who need it most.



SELIM'S COMEBACK: REBUILDING LIFE WITH SHAKTI

Md. Selim Mia once lived a stable life in a small village in Patuakhali with his wife and four young children. He worked as a farm laborer relying on seasonal crops to support his family. But everything changed when a powerful river erosion destroyed their land, home, and all their belongings. Left with nothing, Selim packed what little was left and moved his family to Dhaka hoping to find a fresh start and better opportunities for a brighter future.

Life in the city was very hard. Selim struggled to find steady work and often came home with barely enough money to buy food. His wife took on odd jobs doing whatever she could to keep the family afloat. During this difficult time OBHIZATRIK Foundation's Shakti Project reached out to Selim. Seeing his strong determination and willingness to rebuild his life, the foundation gave him a battery-run auto-rickshaw through its End Ultra Poverty Program (EUPP).

"There were nights when my children went to sleep hungry, and I was searching for work, unsure if we'd survive another day. In those darkest moments, when no one else was there Shakti stood beside me," Selim recalls. Along with the auto-rickshaw, he received valuable training and continuous support to manage his earnings wisely and save for the future.

Today, Selim earns a stable income and is gradually transforming his family's future. His children have returned to school, his elder son helps him earn money and his wife is learning tailoring with hopes of starting her own small business very soon. With tears in his eyes and a hopeful smile Selim shares his deep gratitude and looks forward to a brighter tomorrow filled with new possibilities.

Since its inception, the SHAKTI Project has supported over 150 ultra-poor households across Bangladesh, providing income-generating assets, training and mentoring. Each success story like Selim's demonstrates how targeted, sustainable interventions can break the cycle of extreme poverty and open the door to lasting opportunity.



Rabeya Akter's story is one of quiet resilience and unfulfilled dreams, until opportunity finally knocks. Raised in a vulnerable household in rural Bangladesh, Rabeya grew up watching others work the land with purpose and pride. From her earliest memories, she longed to do something meaningful on her own. But like many girls in her village, her journey was cut short by early marriage. Her dreams were buried beneath daily struggles, domestic duties and the heavy burden of poverty.

Through the Shokkhom Project, she received support and training to cultivate land and turn her long-lost dream into a sustainable livelihood. With a piece of land, basic tools and encouragement, she began growing vegetables, not just for sustenance but for market sale, allowing her to contribute financially to her household for the first time in her life.

Today, Rabeya is no longer just a homemaker, she is a farmer, a provider and a symbol of what's possible when women are given a chance to rise.

FOOD & NUTRITION program

At OBHIZATRIK Foundation, we believe that no one should be left behind on the journey to better health and well-being. In 2024, our comprehensive nutrition program continued to ensure that children, adults and the elderly in underprivileged communities received the nourishment they need to thrive. We know that well-nourished children grow stronger, learn better, and actively participate in their communities, even during the most challenging times. Unfortunately, the harsh reality is that many of the most vulnerable people in our society face serious challenges in accessing enough nutritious food. According to a UNICEF report from June 2024, two out of every three children under five in Bangladesh are living in child food poverty, consuming fewer than the five recommended food groups for adequate nutrition. The problem extends beyond children, as 37.7 million people experienced moderate to severe food insecurity in 2023 due to economic pressures and rising food prices.

To address this critical issue, OBHIZATRIK carries out a wide range of food assistance programs that do more than just reduce hunger; they promote overall health and well-being across all ages. We've been particularly focused on sustainable and impactful solutions this past year. Our programs are designed to meet the specific needs of different communities, providing not just temporary aid but long-term access to healthy foods. Every single intervention, from daily feeding programs to monthly grocery support and emergency relief during disasters, is a step toward building a healthier, stronger future.

For a child, good nutrition means having the energy to focus and learn in school. Our partnership with Muslim Charity UK on the "Appayon" community kitchen project, for example, is a testament to this philosophy. This initiative provides weekly, nutritious meals to anyone in need, treating them with the respect and dignity they deserve. For young adults, it provides the strength to work and support their families. Our "Sobar Jonno Iftar" program during Ramadan in 2024 were a massive success, providing meals to over 1.5 million individuals. For elderly people, it ensures the dignity and security of going to bed without hunger.

Beyond just providing food, our efforts also include nutrition education to raise awareness about healthy eating habits, aiming to improve long-term health outcomes for individuals and families. The sheer scale of our work is a testament to the dedication of our volunteers and partners. In 2024, OBHIZATRIK's emergency response team, for instance, was on the front lines, providing relief to hundreds of thousands of people during the flash floods. This work demonstrates how our nutrition program is a core part of our broader humanitarian efforts. Through these combined efforts, OBHIZATRIK Foundation is fighting hunger, fostering hope, and working toward a fairer, more just society where no one is left behind.

EVENTS UNDER NUTRITION PROGRAM

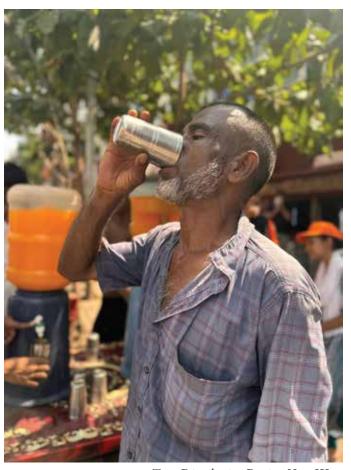

In another heartwarming event, Xcel Bespoke organized a delightful lunch for the students at OBHIZATRIK School. Beyond serving a delicious meal the team engaged warmly with the students, creating a warm and welcoming atmosphere full of joy and connection. The Xcel Bespoke team actively participated in cooking and serving the food which made the experience even more memorable and special for the children. The students thoroughly enjoyed both the meal and the meaningful interactions leaving with full hearts and big smiles that reflected their happiness and excitement.

During a recent scorching heatwave that swept across the city OBHIZATRIK reached out to the local community by distributing fresh juice. This small but meaningful gesture aimed to offer relief and comfort to those enduring the harsh weather conditions. The intense heat made everyday tasks difficult and with every glass of juice given, we hoped to provide hydration and a moment of ease to people passing by. Through these ongoing efforts OBHIZATRIK continues to show care and support not only to our students but also to the wider community around us.

APPAYON COMMUNITY KITCHEN

APPAYON, named after the Bengali word that reflects the gracious act of serving food with respect, is OBHIZATRIK Foundation's community kitchen initiative designed to ensure that "no one sleeps hungry." Launched during Ramadan 2023 in partnership with Muslim Charity UK, the kitchen operates from our school premises in Mirpur and provides freshly cooked, nutritious meals to vulnerable communities who struggle with food insecurity.

Since its inception, Appayon has operated four days a week, preparing and distributing warm meals to children, elderly individuals, daily wage earners and families in need. Each meal is prepared with care by a dedicated team of volunteers, including senior students and community members, who not only contribute their time but also foster a spirit of solidarity and inclusiveness. What began with the distribution of around 5,000 meals during Ramadan 2023 has now grown into a consistent community service that has delivered more than 335,500 nourishing meals by July 2024. On average, between 300 and 500 meals are served on each operational day, ensuring that hundreds of individuals are able to eat with dignity and without fear of going hungry.

The impact of APPAYON extends beyond food. It has become a shared space where people from different walks of life come together in service and respect, reinforcing values of compassion, kindness, and inclusivity. By reducing hunger while also building social bonds, the initiative demonstrates how community-driven solutions can address urgent needs while laying the foundation for long-term resilience.

APPAYON is now a recognized symbol of hope within the communities it serves. Its success has shown that small but consistent interventions can create lasting change and OBHIZATRIK Foundation remains committed to expanding this initiative further to ensure that thousands more families can benefit from the security of regular, nutritious meals.





EMERGENCY RESPONSE

For over 14 years, our Emergency Response program has been a vital part of the OBHIZATRIK Foundation's mission to provide disaster relief and emergency preparedness. Our commitment is simple: to be there for people when they need us most. In 2024, as Bangladesh faced a series of devastating events, from flash floods to Cyclone Remal, our work was put to the ultimate test. I'm incredibly proud to say we were on the frontlines, providing relief to 9,58,716 people who were affected by flash floods alone. Our work isn't just about responding to a crisis; it's about being a steadfast presence in our communities.

We understand that swift and efficient action is critical during times of crisis. That's why we rely on our dedicated network of over 3,500 volunteers, who are always ready to mobilize quickly and provide immediate support. Our ability to respond effectively reflects our deep commitment to building community resilience. In 2024, our teams not only addressed urgent needs but also focused on long-term recovery efforts, helping affected communities rebuild their lives and livelihoods. For instance, after the floods, we didn't just provide food; we rebuilt 350 homes and gave cash grants for house repairs, offering a pathway to stability for those who had lost everything.

Our emergency relief efforts are as varied as the communities we serve. During the floods in areas like Sylhet and Kurigram, we provided cooked meals for 23,000 people and distributed emergency dry food to over 1,500 individuals. During other emergencies, we've delivered food packages, distributed warm clothing in cold affected areas, and provided shelter and essential supplies to fire victims. We work closely with local authorities and grassroots organizations, like our collaboration with Muslim Charity UK, to ensure aid reaches the right people at the right time in the most efficient manner.

Beyond direct relief, we invest heavily in preparedness. We conduct awareness campaigns, emergency drills, and community training programs to help people prepare for disasters and respond effectively. Our "Project Shokkhom" is a prime example of this, as we plan to use it to create micro-business models and provide livelihoods to 500 families who were displaced by the floods, ensuring they can rebuild for the future. By empowering communities with knowledge and practical tools, we aim to reduce risks, minimize damage, and save lives.

Our work spans many vulnerable areas, from cyclone-prone coastal zones to floodplains and fire-prone slums in Dhaka. As climate change and other challenges increase the frequency and intensity of disasters, we remain committed to ensuring that no one is left behind, providing hope, safety, and critical support when it is needed most.

HIGHLIGHTS

FLOOD 2024

OBHIZATRIK provided urgent relief to affected families across several districts by distributing essential dry food packs. Thousands of people were left stranded without access to food and our team ensured that relief reached them in time. Each pack included basic necessities such as rice, lentils, puffed rice, biscuits, instant foods and drinking water. OBHIZATRIK's relief efforts were driven by the commitment to stand beside those in need. During the devastating floods of 2024, OBHIZATRIK mobilized its teams across several affected districts to rescue and support thousands of people who were stranded and unable to reach safety. With rising waters leaving entire communities isolated, our volunteers worked tirelessly and used boats to evacuate families and individuals to shelters. The dedication of our volunteers and the collective effort of our community made it possible to bring hope and safety to thousands during this critical time.

Carrying Hope Through Floodwaters, Flood 2024

EMERGENCY RESCUE SUPPORT

In response to the flooding in Feni, a coordinated rescue operation was launched consisting of a team of over 40 trained volunteers and water scouts, additionally, about 130 volunteers were supporting the rescue teams. These dedicated individuals worked tirelessly for 10 days, utilizing 8 fibre boats and 2 engine trawlers to conduct rescue missions across various affected areas within Feni. Their combined efforts resulted in the successful rescue of at least 548 vulnerable individuals, including pregnant women, children, elderly people and people needing emergency medical care ensuring their safety and well-being during this critical period.

The team promptly relocated about 250 affected individuals to shelter homes. Specialattention was given to vulnerable groups, including pregnant women, elderly individuals, and children, who were transferred to nearby hospitals for immediate medical care.

MEDICAL CAMP



Access to proper healthcare became nearly impossible for many as floodwaters cut off entire communities. In response, OBHIZATRIK organized multiple medical camps across various affected location, endorsed by IDLC Finance, ZXY international & Huawei, to ensure that people could receive the care they urgently needed. These camps provided essential medical services, including treatment for waterborne diseases, fevers, and infections, as well as distributing basic medicines and health supplies.

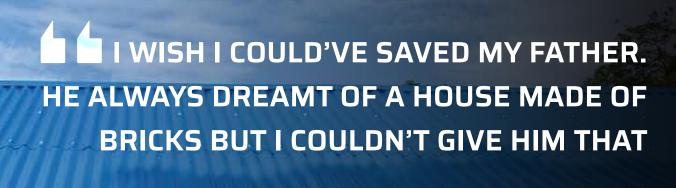


REHABILITATION

OBHIZATRIK launched a rehabilitation program focused on rebuilding homes for those most affected. We worked closely with the community to construct safe and sturdy shelters, providing families with a fresh start and a place to rebuild their lives. We have built more than 350 houses in various districts.

Abdul Karim, a small shopkeeper from Feni, lived a simple life with his family, his father, his wife and their two children. He sold everyday goods in the local market, earning just enough to support his family and keep their small, mud-built home standing.

In just a few days, everything Karim had built over the years was washed away by the flood. The tragedy didn't stop there, he lost his father in the disaster, a heartbreak too deep to bear. Karim stood helpless and unable to protect his family or the life they had known. His shop, his source of income, was submerged and destroyed. All that remained was loss and despair.

Karim returned to the ruins of his home, finding only broken memories and shattered dreams. With no shelter and no way to earn a living, he faced an uncertain future. Recognizing the immense challenges faced by Karim, OBHIZATRIK built a new home for him. A sturdy, safe house with brick walls and a tin roof. It wasn't just a house it was a fresh start, a symbol of resilience and hope.

Today Karim is slowly piecing his life back together. His children have a safe place to sleep again. The pain of loss remains but with the support from OBHIZATRIK Karim and his family have found the strength to move forward. He remembered his father while handing over the home and could not hold his tears. Karim's smile reminds us why OBHIZATRIK's work matters because behind every number, every relief package and every home rebuilt there is a life like Karim's, a family waiting for hope and a future that can still be written.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

OBHIZATRIK Foundation's Community Development program is committed to tackling the root causes of poverty by providing sustainable, long-term solutions instead of relying solely on short-term relief efforts. The program focuses on vulnerable villages where poverty and hardship are most severe, implementing holistic initiatives that touch every important area of community life such as education, healthcare, economic empowerment and social development.

A core principle of the program is sustainability. To support lasting change the foundation integrates renewable energy solutions that help uplift communities by providing clean, reliable power, reducing dependence on non-renewable sources and lowering environmental impact. At the same time, OBHIZATRIK remains responsive to urgent needs through practical interventions such as flood recovery efforts, home rehabilitation projects and mosque renovations. The program also installs water pumps to improve access to clean water and organizes vaccination campaigns to protect public health and prevent disease outbreaks particularly in underserved areas.

Additionally, awareness programs and skill-building initiatives form an important part of the foundation's work, empowering individuals with the knowledge and abilities needed to improve their livelihoods and contribute positively to their communities. These activities foster social cohesion, promote gender equality, and encourage active community participation in sustainable development efforts. This comprehensive approach ensures that interventions are both meaningful and impactful.

The program's adaptability and flexibility allow it to operate effectively in diverse locations across Bangladesh. By delivering scalable and context-specific solutions OBHIZATRIK Foundation is able to transform lives and foster resilient, thriving communities. Through these combined efforts, the foundation continues to build stronger, healthier and more sustainable futures for vulnerable populations, paving the way for long-lasting positive change and enhanced quality of life.





Project Green

PROJECT GREEN: 5,000 TREES PLANTED, FOR A SUSTAINABLE TOMORROW

At OBHIZATRIK, we strongly believe in nurturing the environment to create a greener and healthier future for all. As part of this commitment to sustainability we launched Project Green, supported by ZXY International, an ambitious initiative focused on increasing green cover and raising awareness about the vital role trees play in maintaining a balanced ecosystem.

Since its inception Project Green has successfully planted over **5,000 trees** across various locations. These efforts contribute directly to combating climate change by absorbing carbon dioxide, improving air quality and supporting local biodiversity. Trees also help prevent soil erosion, provide shade and create habitats for birds and other wildlife which benefits both people and nature alike.

Beyond planting, a key aspect of Project Green is community involvement. We distributed a significant number of saplings to individuals passionate about the environment, encouraging them to plant trees in their own communities and homes. This approach not only extends the project's reach but also fosters a deeper connection between people and nature promoting environmental stewardship.

Project Green is more than just an environmental campaign; it's about cultivating a sense of shared responsibility and collective action. By engaging the community, we aim to inspire ongoing green consciousness and environmental stewardship that lasts well beyond the duration of the project.

Through Project Green, OBHIZATRIK hopes to empower individuals and communities to protect and preserve their natural surroundings contributing to a sustainable future where both people and the planet can thrive together.



WASTE TO WELFARE: THE JOURNEY OF SCRAP

As one of Bangladesh's leading e-commerce platforms **Daraz Bangladesh Ltd** supplies a wide range of products across the country every day. However, over time many items in their warehouses remain unsold and are eventually classified as scrap even though they are still in perfectly usable condition.

Recognizing both the waste and the opportunity to help, OBHIZATRIK Foundation partnered with Daraz Bangladesh LTD to ensure these products find meaningful new purposes. Together, we launched an initiative to redistribute unsold but usable products among underprivileged communities across Bangladesh. This effort aims to ease the daily struggles of families who face challenges in meeting their basic needs.

The distribution happens through charitable fairs where individuals and families in need can freely access a variety of products, including household items, clothing and essentials. The funds generated from these fairs are reinvested to further support vulnerable communities and expand the program's reach to more areas nationwide ensuring a wider positive impact.

Beyond individual aid, the partnership also extends support to small businesses by providing them with essential items and equipment. This assistance helps them grow, create livelihoods and sustain their families ultimately contributing to local economic development and community resilience.

Through this collaboration Daraz and OBHIZATRIK Foundation are transforming potential waste into valuable resources, promoting social welfare and environmental sustainability and making a positive impact across communities in Bangladesh every day.

PARTNERS FOR PROSPERITY (PFP)

The "Partners for Prosperity (PFP)" project is a bold and inspiring initiative by Muslim Charity UK & OBHIZATRIK, aimed at empowering youth-led organizations to become active drivers of positive change within their communities. At its core, the project is founded on the belief that young people possess the passion, creativity and firsthand understanding of local challenges needed to create lasting meaningful impact.

Through direct cash grants the PFP project provides youth organizations with the financial freedom and autonomy to design and implement solutions tailored specifically to their community's unique needs. By removing bureaucratic barriers and placing trust in youth leadership PFP enables these young changemakers to lead with innovation, creativity and strong purpose.

More than just a funding mechanism PFP serves as a catalyst for youth-led social development. It encourages leadership, accountability and grassroots transformation across a wide range of issues. From addressing urgent environmental concerns to tackling gaps in education, health and social services. The youth-led initiatives supported under PFP are actively building more inclusive, resilient and self-sustaining communities. The impact of the PFP project goes well beyond immediate solutions. It is nurturing a generation of responsible and empowered youth who are not waiting for change, they are leading it themselves. Through PFP, these young leaders are shaping a brighter future for their communities, inspiring others to join their movement for sustainable development and creating networks of collaboration across regions.

SUPPORTING CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY IN AUGUST 2024

In August 2024, Bangladesh entered a historic period of social and political change. The movement was ignited by long-standing demands for reform of the government's job quota system, a policy that had become a focal point for frustration among students and young citizens.

During August 2024, when regular systems of traffic and public management came to a halt, it was students and ordinary citizens who stepped forward to keep the streets functioning. With no police presence and no formal traffic control, young people organized themselves to maintain order at intersections, guide vehicles safely, and ensure that daily movement could continue as smoothly as possible under the circumstances. Their efforts reflected an extraordinary sense of responsibility and collective discipline.

Recognizing both their dedication and their immediate needs, OBHIZATRIK Foundation provided targeted support to sustain these volunteers and passerby contributors. Our teams distributed essential items at key points across the city, including caps to shield them from the sun, clean drinking water to prevent dehydration, oral saline to replenish energy, and packets of juice to keep them refreshed during long hours of service. To further assist their efforts in managing traffic, OBHIZATRIK also supplied simple but effective tools such as hand-held signs. These small interventions enabled students and community members to carry out their duties more safely and effectively, while also giving them recognition for the critical role they played.

By supporting those who voluntarily stepped in to maintain civic order, OBHIZATRIK not only provided material relief but also strengthened the spirit of unity and cooperation that defined this period.

Independent Auditor's Report To the Governing Body of OBHIZATRIK Foundation

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of OBHIZATRIK Foundation, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2024, and the Statement of Income and Expenditure, statement of changes in Fund, statement of Receipts & Payments and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of OBHIZATRIK Foundation as at 30 June 2024, and of its financial performance, and its statement of receipts and payments for the year then ended in accordance with note # 2 to the financial statements.

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (ISAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Entity in accordance the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these ethical requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with IFRSs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

1.00 Reporting Entity

1.10 Formation and Legal Status

Obhizatrik Foundation is a non-government, non-profitable, non-political, voluntary and charitable organization. It has been registered with NGOAB under the provisions of the Foreign Donations (Voluntary Activities) Regulation Act, 2016 on 4th July 2022. The Registration Number is - 3301. Obhizatrik Foundation has also been registered with RJSC (Registration of Joint Stock Companies & Firms) under the society Registration Act, XXI of 1860 on 27th November 2014. The registration number is S-12013. The Registered office of the foundation is situated at Road No- 2D, House No- 5, Pallabi, Mirpur, Dhaka-1216, Bangladesh.

Operational Area: The area of operation of the foundation is all over Bangladesh.

1.20 Nature of the Organization Activities

OBHIZATRIK Foundation runs a diverse range of projects, both short-term and long-term as well as campaigns under 6 different kinds of programmes that include Education programme, Health & Nutrition programme, Livelihood programme, Community Development programme, Emergency Response and Climate action programme, Training and Skills development programme.

The projects under the above programs ensure providing full-free quality education, livelihood earning opportunities, ensuring food and nutrition security and free healthcare facilities for the less-privileged. Additionally, the foundation's voluntary activities include organizing and executing food campaigns for the destitute, providing relief medicine and resource support during times of crisis and natural disasters, distributing free healthcare equipment to rural health workers, providing winter gifts to the underprivileged and carrying free educational program related to maternal health and child health and sanitation behavior.

1.2.1 OBHIZATRIK School

OBHIZATRIK Foundation has 3 (Three) schools located at Mirpur and Rayer Bazar in Dhaka and at Char Lata village in Patuakhali. A sustainable project by OBHIZATRIK Foundation that provides full free quality education to approximately 600 underprivileged children in the urban and coastal areas. On top of being fully free, OBHI ZATRIK School also provides all sorts of learning accessories, food and healthcare support to encourage underprivileged children to attend school regularly. Every month our students receive health check-up facilities and free medicines from the school.

1.2.2 Health and Nutrition program

To combat hunger and poverty-related starvation, our Health and Nutrition program oversees free food-giving projects and campaigns. We have implemented our nutrition program with different events including Joy of Giving, Bina Poyshar Bazar & Amar Dawat.

The aim of the "Joy of Giving" campaign is to include the underprivileged members of our society during the celebration of Ramadan, Eid and other festivities. We share the joy of these events with the people by providing them cooked meals, grocery packs and special meals.

Amar Dawat project provides free meal of bread, banana and tea to anyone who asks for it. Approximately 9,000 people receive food aid monthly in various areas of Dhaka.

Free health check-up sessions are conducted for the impoverished communities who lack essential medical services.

OBHIZATRIK Foundation conducts various campaign about creating awareness, promoting healthcare services and distributing necessary kits to the underprivileged who lack access to healthcare facilities for defeating diarrhoea diseases.

We provide healthy meals to the impoverished population to reduce the impact of food insecurity and starvation causes by poverty.

1.2.3 Livelihood programme

With a view to empowering the extremely poor population of our society, OBHIZATRIK Foundation first conceptualized the project SHOKKHOM. SHOKKHOM project provides fully-developed, free-of-cost business model setups to eradicate poverty. This program is centered on improving the lives and livelihood of the underprivileged.

Currently there are 4 main categories under which several business models are provided based on the skill sets and prior experience of the candidates. These categories are Agro-based models, Livestock business models, Transportation based models and Small enterprise.

Under SHOKKHOM Model Village (SMV) programme, SHOKKHOM project creates a full model village and provide Income Generating Activities (IGA) to the villagers for empowering the rural communities.

End Ultra Poverty Program (EUPP) is a unique model to increase income for the underprivileged people by providing asset with 0% interest.

1.2.4 Community Development programme

OBHIZATRIK Foundation takes Community Development programme by targeting specific communities or villages that are extremely impoverished and conducting development projects such as building shelters for the homeless, equipping existing houses with electricity facilities, drinking water provisions, setting up hygienic toilets etc. This program also ensures that the inhabitants of the villages or communities will be self-sufficient socially, economically and financially.

Solar Village project is aimed to empower under privileged rural communities by providing them means of sustainable solar-powered electricity facilities.

Those families who lost their home during natural disaster, we provide them new shelter location with a rehabilitation program.

1.2.5 Emergency Response and Climate action programme

During any sudden crises or on the wake of any natural disasters, OBHIZATRIK Foundation has always been the fastest responders. Our volunteers and dedicated teams engage in on-field expeditions to carry and distribute food aid, relief, clothing and medicines to the victims.

With the onset of global warming and drastic changes in our climate, we are carrying out small-scale tree plantation programs. Through this campaign we involved the students of OBHIZATRIK School to teach them about the adverse effects of climate change and the important role played by plants to maintain balance in the climate.

Every year our country is affected by mon soon floods. We have supported the flood affected families with emergency relief and food support during the floods.

Project GREEN, OBHIZATRIK Foundation raise awareness of climate change and maintain a supply chain for food, distribution of fruit, vegetable, and medicinal trees to the disadvantaged school pupils.

1.2.6 Training and Skills development programme

Training and Skill Development program aims to train underprivileged men and women crafting skill, farming skills and business skills so that they can use their knowledge to become socially and financially self-sufficient.

Sewing training for the destitute women campaign provides 1-month long sewing training for underprivileged women so that they can use their skills to earn and escape poverty.

OBHIZATRIK Foundation takes a diverse training program focusing on SME models and Enterprise business

1.2.7 Sheikh Russel Child Training & Rehabilitation Center

Sheikh Russel Child Training & Rehabilitation Center required improvement in child care, education, medical facilities, food and good accommodation for the underprivileged and special need children.

To support the revitalization of Sheikh Russel Child Training & Rehabilitation Center to ensure child care, education, medical facilities, food and good accommodation for the underprivileged and special need children.

1.2.8 Project Shakti-EUPP

Economic empowerment for underprivileged group through capacity development and advocacy. To ensure economic empowerment for the less privileged group of Bangladesh who are living under the poverty line; Implementing capacity development and advocacy programs for overlooked and disadvantaged population; Building a safer and inclusive society by empowering and engaging venerable group.

1.30 Objectives of the Organization

Obhizatrik Foundation is working to focus on empowering the underprivileged population all over the country. The aim of the Foundation is to interdependent our country through working on these sectors: Poverty, Education, Health and Nutrition, Human Rights, Environment, etc.

1.40 Fund Mobilization and Utilization

The Foundation Accepts donation, in cash or cheque, from its members or board of directors or from any other person, institution, foundation or company from home or abroad and the donation received will only be used towards the promotion and maintenance of the objectives of the foundation.

1.50 Utilization of Income of the Foundation

The income will be added with Fund after proper taxation applicable by Income tax Act 2023.

2.03 Basis of measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on historical cost basis.

2.04 Functional and presentational currency

These financial statements are prepared in Bangladesh Taka (Taka/Tk/BDT), which is the Company's functional currency. All financial information presented in Taka has been rounded off to the nearest integer unless otherwise

2.05 Use of estimates and judgments

The preparation of financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting polices and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenses. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimates are revised and in any future periods affected.

2.06 Going concern

The financial statements of the Foundation are prepared on a going concern basis. As per management assessment, there are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions which may cast significant doubt upon Entity's ability to continue as a going concern.

2.07 Statement of Receipts and Payments

In previous year, Cash Flow Statement has been presented as per International Accounting Standard (IAS) 7 but during the year audit report, Statement of Cash flows has been replaced by Statement of Receipts and Payments.

2.08 Reporting period

The financial statement of the company covers the period from 01 July 2023 to 30 June 2024.

3.00 Significant Accounting Policies

The specific accounting policies selected and applied by the company's directors for significant transactions and events that have material effect within the framework of IAS-1 "Presentation of Financial Statements", in preparation and presentation of financial statements have been consistently applied throughout the year and were also consistent with those used in earlier years.

For a proper understanding of the financial statements, these accounting policies are set out below in one place as prescribed by the IAS-1 "Presentation of Financial Statements". The recommendations of IAS-1 relating the format of financial statements were also taken into full consideration for fair presentation.

3.01 Property, plant and equipment's

Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment's is measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. The cost of item of property, plant and equipment's comprises of purchase price and any costs directly attributable to bringing the assets to the location and condition necessary for it to be capable of operating in the intended manner.

Subsequent costs

The cost of replacing part of an item of property, plant and equipment's will be recognized in the carrying amount of the item if it is probable that the future economic benefits embodied within the part will flow to the entity and its cost can be measured reliably. The costs of the day-to-day servicing of property, plant and equipment are recognized in the statement of financial performance as incurred.

Depreciation

Items of property, plant and equipment's are depreciated from the date they are available for use and ready for use.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of items of property, plant and equipment's less their estimated residual values using the straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives. Depreciation is generally recognized in profit or loss, unless the amount is included in the carrying amount of another asset. For addition to property, plant and equipment's, depreciation is provided on a pro-rata basis on the property, plant and equipment's acquired and disposed during the year. The rates at which property, plant and equipment's are depreciated for current and comparative years are given below:

Depreciation methods, rates and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and adjusted if appropriate.

Depreciation is calculated monthly basis to all assets including the addition during the year and charged accordingly.

3.02 Investments

Long Term Investment in "City Light Properties Ltd." with interest bearing rate 4% per annum.

Short Term Investment included Investment in "Galachipa Modern Agro Industries (Pvt.) Ltd." with interest bearing rate 10% per annum.

Both short term and long term investments has been recorded under cost value method.

3.03 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, cash at Mobile Financial Services (MFS), and cash at banks which are held by the entity without any restriction.

3.04 Provisions

A provision is recognized in the statement of financial position when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation as a result of past event. It is provable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. Provision is ordinarily measured at the best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the reporting date.

3.05 Office Rent

If Office rent agreement period is more than one year, it is treated as per IFRS 16. As OBHIZATRIK Foundation's Office

3.06 Comparative Information

Presentation of financial statements for all numeric information in the financial statements and also numeric and descriptive information where its relevant for understanding of the current year's financial statements.

3.07 Current tax

Provision for current year's taxation is based on the element of income and expenditure as reported on the financial statements and is computed in accordance with the provision of the prevailing Income Tax Act 2023.

3.08 Events after reporting period

Events after the reporting period that provide additional information about the entity's position at the date of statement of financial position or those that indicate the going concern assumption is not appropriate are reflected in the financial statements. Events after the reporting period that are not adjusting events are disclosed in the notes when material.
